

Summer camp teaches youth about forensic science with mock murder scenario

Institute, WV – Area youth are taking a cue from the popular CSI television series and learning about the science involved in crime scene investigation thanks to the Health Sciences and Technology Academy (HSTA) summer institute. The institute, hosted by West Virginia State University Extension Service, allows participants to view a mock murder scene and try to figure out “who did it?” The weeklong residential camp is being held Sunday, June 22nd, through Friday, June 27th, on the WVSU campus.

During the week, participants view a mock murder scene, interview suspects, use scientific knowledge to search for clues, and ultimately attempt to solve the crime. During the camp’s closing ceremony on Friday, the youth act out scenarios based on what they think took place at the scene of the crime.

“The kids have fun while they learn at this summer institute,” said Kelli Jackson, Extension Agent for Youth Development with WVSU Extension Service and director of the camp. “They are nurturing their math and science skills in a format that is unique and interesting to them.”

The forensics institute is one portion of what is a statewide HSTA curriculum created by West Virginia University. The program follows 9th-12th grade minority and underrepresented students through their high school careers and into college, preparing them for science and healthcare careers.
